Contemporary Culture Workshop 2

Main points

Learn how to learn about culture!

Become aware of your cultural lens.

Use English as much as possible.

Prepare workshop assignments well.

When contemplating aspects of contemporary culture, ask why they exist and what is their special meaning.

Become aware when stereotypes are being formed.

Watch for examples of contemporary culture—people's 1) objects, 2) behaviors, 3) language, & 4) beliefs and their interrelations.

Remember steps to understanding contemporary culture: 1) **Open Attitude**, 2) **Understanding Identity**, 3) **Knowledge of Culture**, & 4) **Understanding Systems**

Student comments

I was surprised that there are differences between young people and old people that live in the same country. I think the culture that we know is only one aspect because we haven't thought about our own culture seriously.

When I saw the picture of the native woman who eats beaver, I thought it was yucky. But eating chicken or cattle might seem strange to her. I thought my cultural lens was narrow. I realized OA is important to study contemporary culture.

You told us you don't know everything about your country, Canada. I find, however, that not only don't I know about Japan, but also about my town, Nagoya.

I'll try not to judge people by their appearance or their cultural stereotypes. This class has been really informative for my life.

There are a lot of things I don't know. We'll never be able to know everything about culture. I should keep in mind there will be a lot of things I never know.
